

**St. Benedict's Preparatory School
Pep Band & Drum Line Curriculum
Summer Term 2017**

Purpose:

The Pep Band and Drum Line are meant to be ensembles that perform music most often associated with marching bands and sporting events, such as fanfares, rally cries, and high-energy numbers meant to excite a crowd. Most high schools have a week of band camp in August as a preparation for the upcoming school year. While our groups meet for a month in the summer and have no set performance calendar in the fall, the groups will learn the material well enough that they can be reconfigured on short notice if asked to play at various points in the fall and winter term, including at soccer games or the annual basketball tournament. A second purpose is to develop practice skills and a warm-up routine that students can continue to follow throughout the school year.

Instruments:

St. Benedict's has a large (but limited) number of instruments that are available for student use. In order to use a school instrument, students and their parents must sign a statement of responsibility. Students may also use their own instruments or rent one for personal use. Dr. Fletcher can assist students in locating a music store from which to rent. Other materials, including reeds, swabs, and cork grease, will be provided by the school.

FAQ

1. *Why is an A equal to 96% instead of 100%?* This is because nobody is perfect.
2. *Are there plus or minus grades?* Yes, this either adds or subtracts 3 points. For example, a B+ = 90% and an A- = 93%.
3. *How do alert slips affect my class participation grade?* An alert slip related to class participation lowers your grade by 3%. One alert slip drops you from an A (96%) to an A- (93%).

Late Policy

Every third time a student is late, his OVERALL grade will be lowered by 3%.

Attendance:

In ensemble classes, attendance is extremely important. Most of the work is not written and therefore is impossible to make up. Even if a student learns the music on his own, an absence still negatively impacts the quality of a rehearsal for the other students involved. As a result, unexcused absences and or cutting class will lower a student's class participation grade by 6% for each instance. Notification by the student or his parents of the intent to be absent does not guarantee that the absence will be excused. All school-sanctioned events (such as athletic events and field trips) will count as excused absences upon receipt of a student list from the coach or trip moderator. If a student misses more than five classes in summer term due to absence (excused or unexcused), it is the school's policy that he cannot receive credit for the class and will fail, except if all make-up work is completed, in which case he will receive an audit.

Music Proficiency Test

Music students will be graded on their proficiency. Pep Band students will be required to play scales and chords in several keys. Next, they will be expected to perform an excerpt from the repertoire that they have learned. Third, students can expect to sight read a short passage. Finally, students will play a short etude demonstrating their

knowledge of dynamic markings, articulation, and expression. Drum Line students will be tested on rudiments and rolls at a variety of tempos, repertoire, sight-reading, their ability to keep a steady tempo, and their ability to play with dynamics.

Practicing: Nothing has a bigger impact on musical development than individual practice. This is the equivalent of homework on a musical instrument. Through practice, students learn how to problem solve independently and how to become musically self-reliant. This benefits not just the individual but also the ensemble, because rehearsal time becomes focused on group success and not individual problems. Therefore, students are required to practice between 15 and 30 minutes a day. If individual circumstances make practicing at home difficult, then arrangements can be made for a student to practice at school immediately after the school day.

Performances:

The Pep Band and Drum Line will perform in front of an audience at least twice during the five weeks of summer term. The first definite performance will take place in the afternoon on Sunday, August 20th at Monkfest. The second performance will take place at convocation during the last week of summer phase. There may also be a performance for the freshman parents on the evening of Wednesday, August 9th.

Extra Help

Extra help is available everyday in the band room for one hour after school ends. Advanced notice is appreciated, because otherwise the teacher may leave the room to accomplish other tasks.

Google Docs and Student Email

In order to receive and submit many assignments and other documents (such as this syllabus), students must have the ability to use Google Docs. This means that they must have a functioning Google email account provided by the school that they check and maintain regularly. It is the student's responsibility to make sure that this is working. Band Room Policies

1. The computers are only for use on music class assignments. All other activities have to be approved by Dr. Fletcher.
2. Students are not permitted in the band room without an adult employee of SBP present. Anyone found in the band room without an adult present will be cited with a Community Commitment Code violation.
3. If an instrument breaks, let Dr. Fletcher know immediately. Do not try to fix it yourself and do not take someone else's equipment. Make sure that you save all the parts.
4. No cell phones or other electronic devices. If a cell phone is used in class for calling, texting, or any of its other functions, it will be collected and given to Mr. Rowe.
5. No food. It will be collected and thrown out.
